

**Birds of the Cayman Islands.**—Patricia Bradley. 1985. Published by the author.— This book describes the avifauna of the Cayman Islands, including its little know-

colonial waterbirds. Each species account includes field characters, range, habitat in the Caymans, habits, and status; and many are illustrated in full page color photographs by Yves-Jacques Rey-Millet. The locations of colonial waterbird sites are specific: the White-tailed Tropicbird (*Phaethon lepturus*), for example, can be found on the north-east bluff on Cayman Brac and the bluff between Spots and Pedro on Grand Cayman. The Red-footed Booby (*Sula sula*)—two photographs—occupies a breeding and roosting colony of 4000 birds associated with Magnificent Frigatebirds (*Fregata magnificens*)—three photographs—in Little Cayman. It is a fine little book that suggests many possibilities for research sites. As Oscar T. Owre stated in his preface, this is a field guide that offers opportunities.
